Solid Waste Management through Vermiculture

2. Goal

Solid Waste disposal in eco friendly manner

3. The Context

The decomposable solid wastes are a nuisance near the college canteen, Hostel and in the gardens. They have to be disposed properly without causing pollution to the environment.

4. The Practice

Volunteers and students who are willing to participate were enrolled for training in Vermiculture. The training was funded by UGC – Auto grant and was organized by Part V coordinator with the support of faculty of Zoology. Students were divided into groups for collection of decomposable wastes on daily bases and the collected waste materials were subjected for partial decomposition and then for vermin composting. The collected vermifertilizers was distributed to local farmers with a free consultancy service for Vermiculture. The training was given for 30 days. The vermi compost units are maintained by research scholars and students of Department of Zoology after the training period was over.

5. Evidence of Success

- The local farmers were informed about the consultancy service provided in the college and they assured for practicing organic farming
- Many students with agriculture background are continuing the practice in their village and are doing this for their part time income.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

i. Problems Encountered

- Continuity of the programme during vacation period of the college
- Provision of space for carrying out such good practices in the campus

ii. Resources Required

- ✤ Financial assistance for conducting such workshop every year to educate the freshers
- Funds are required for providing Lunch and refreshments during the programmes as it needs physical work

7. Outcome

- The college campus was cleaned and is free of organic ways. It was disposed in an eco friendly manner.
- ✤ The local farmers were educated for organic farming.
- 250 kg of vermicompost was produced. Out of that 50 % was distributed to the farmers and the rest was utilized for College Garden
