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#### PREAMBLE OF THE INSTITUTION

Spiritually known as 'Bhaskara Kshetra', the temple town Kumbakonam is known for its fertile soil and mind. Many intellectual giants like Srinivasa Ramanujan hailed from this town. On the banks of river Arasalar, an educational institution as the second Government College exclusively for Women in the entire State of Tamil Nadu was set up in the year 1963. Smt. R. Radha, MA. L.T., M.A (Aligarh University), an eminent educationalist with a vast administrative exposure took up the reins as the first Principal of the College. During the formative years, Pre-University Course and Under Graduate Courses in Geography and History were stared in the historical site known as "Aramanai Chathiram" on the western bank of Mahamaham Tank. In the year 1966, the then Hon' ble Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu, Thiru. M. Bhakthavatsalam laid the foundation stone for the New Building on the banks of river Arasalar. The new building was inaugurated by the then Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu, Dr.C.N Annadurai on July 28, 1967. Under Graduate Programmes in Mathematics, Chemistry and Economics were introduced in the year 1968-1969. Two more Under Graduate Courses in Zoology and English were introduced in the subsequent year. Further, in the year 1983-84, Under Graduate programmes in Physics, Commerce and Tamil were introduced. The prestigious Post Graduate Course in Geography was started during the academic year 1986-87.

Under Graduate Course in Computer Science was introduced in 1991 and the College was one of the first few Government Colleges to have introduced this Programme. In the academic year 2003-2004, Post Graduate Courses in Commerce, Computer Science, Physics and Mathematics were started on self financing basis. The Centre for Nonlinear Science, a miniature research institute sponsored by Department of Science and Technology (DST) was established and accorded special permission to admit Ph.D. candidates under the guidance of Dr. R. Radha, Associate Professor of Physics in 2005-2006. Post Graduate Courses in Economics, English, Chemistry and History were also introduced in the year 2005-2006 on self financing basis. The above Eight Post Graduate courses were converted into regular courses from the year 2006-2007 onwards. Due to the ever increasing number of applicants and desirability for maximum utilization of the infrastructure available, shift system was introduced as per the orders issued by the Government. Under Graduate courses in Commerce, Computer Science, Tamil, English and History were introduced in Shift II between the years 2006 and 2008. In the academic year 2009-2010, M.Phil Programme in Chemistry was offered. Ph.D. Programmes were introduced in the Departments of Chemistry, English, Zoology and Tamil in the year 2012-2013. Post Graduate programme in Zoology was started in the year 2012-2013. The Centre for Animal Studies (CAS) was Inaugurated with animal house facility during 2013-2014.

NAAC Peer Team visited the College in the year 1999 - 2000 and awarded a 3 star status. The College was subsequently reaccredited with 'B' level in the year 2005 - 2006. The College was conferred "Autonomy" on 9<sup>th</sup> February 2007. Implementation of Autonomy has given greater freedom to bring about radical changes in the academic structure. The Autonomous status has also helped the College to introduce several innovative courses.

At present, the College offers 11 Under Graduate programmes and 11 Post Graduate programmes under Choice Based Credit System (CBCS). The impressive number of University rank holders in every academic year is an ample proof of the growing academic reputation of the institution. Admission of students to various courses is governed strictly by the norms of the State Government following the reservation policy, thereby ensuring social justice.

The grant of Autonomy and the resources mobilized from University Grants Commission have helped in organizing several workshops and seminars. In this connection, experts are invited to deliver lectures in the field of their specialization. This has motivated the students to pursue research programme in their respective areas. The establishment of 50 various Committees helps in coordinating several curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities and the smooth functioning of the institution. Several value based co-curricular activities like Youth Red Cross, Environmental Studies, National Service Scheme, Population Studies and extension programmes like Rotaract and Leo Clubs are also being undertaken by the students. These Programmes help in inculcating a desirable value system in them. The College has been in the service of students community for over half-a-century and has just celebrated its Golden Jubilee.

# **SWOC ANALYSIS**

### **Strengths**

- ❖ Started as the first Women's College in the state after independence, it has completed fifty years of dedicated service to the students community of the districts of Thanjai, Nagai, Thiruvarur, Ariyalur, Cuddalore, Villupuram and Perambalur districts.
- ❖ The College offers 11 UG and 11 PG courses in parallel mediums and B.A (History), B.A (Tamil), B.Sc (Computer Science) and B.Com in two shifts.
- ❖ Seven departments out of eleven are research departments
- Autonomous status has enabled the College to bring in changes as and when needed with respect to curriculum designing, teaching- learning, and evaluation process.
- ❖ An Animal House, a unique facility nonexistent in any Government College of Bharathidasan University.
- **.** UV treated drinking water is made available for the students.
- ❖ The Campus is Wi-Fi enabled. Students can surf net sitting anywhere inside the main campus and internet utility can be monitored through a Firewall.
- ❖ Only Government Arts and Science College in India to have launched National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) Multimedia Portal in the Local Area Network providing an access to 250 video courses on Arts, Science and Humanities.
- ❖ Coaching for SET, NET, examinations and Entry in Services are given for the students freely.
- ❖ An e-library with 10,000 e-books is made available for the benefit of the staff and students.
- Around 3000 free laptops were given to the students in a short span of 3 years.
- ❖ The only Government College in Tamil Nadu to have a Day Care Centre in the College premises.
- ❖ A very successful and active EDC (Entrepreneur Development Cell) provides students with self employment training or Skills.
- \* Remedial classes are given to all weak students (or Slow learner).
- ❖ Bridge course in English is conducted in the beginning of every academic year.
- ❖ A well-equipped Language Lab trains students in communicative English.
- ❖ The Principal and most of the faculty of the College are alumnae of this College.
- ❖ The only Government College in the state to host an inter-collegiate cultural meet in remembrance and honour of the first and founder principal of the College Smt. R. Radha.
- ❖ All the departments have associations and arrange for invited lectures and organize various competitions.
- ❖ State level and national level seminars and workshops are conducted in almost all the departments every vear.
- ❖ The College is one of the few colleges to have completed several sponsored projects funded by DST, UGC, DAE-NBHM and has 4 ongoing projects funded by UGC, DST, CSIR, DAE-NBHM.
- ❖ An active Research Cell which promotes research culture by conducting seminars, symposia, intellectual discussions with external subject experts.
- ❖ Students are trained for study abroad programme and one student from the Department of Chemistry went to UK to study one semester.
- ❖ Bus passes are arranged for the students. Bus facility for the students from the bus stand to the College is arranged.
- ❖ As a unique feature of the college, 50 students have been offered free noon meal from the funds received from the staff since 2005.
- ❖ Excellent community service though various extension activities under NSS, YRC, RRC, EVS, Leo and Rotaract clubs.
- Registered PTA which acts as a bridge between parents and teachers ensures the academic growth of the students and the College.
- ❖ A registered Alumni Association which ropes in old students of the College to have a permanent relationship with their alma mater.

- ❖ Scholarships like BC scholar ship, MBC scholarship, SC scholar ship, ST scholarship, Tamil medium scholarship and minority scholarship are given to students. This means that almost all the students receive scholarships.
- Only Governmeet College to have clustered its high performance computing machines with Bharathidasan University.
- \* CeNSc has tie ups with several national and international Institutes / Universities
- \* CAS has tied up with Go Vignyan Anusandhan Kendra, Nagpur.

### Weaknesses

- ❖ Shortage of permanent teachers for over a period of 15 years.
- Some of the departments do not have industry linkage as mandated by IQAC
- ❖ Lack of technical man power to handle sophisticated equipments
- Since the core strength of the faculty happens to be temporary, they don't have a sense of belonging which impacts the sustanance of various activities.

- ➤ The establishment of 50 various Committees help in coordinating several curricular, cocurricular and extracurricular activities and the smooth functioning of the institution.

## 1.1.2 Mechanism used in the design and development of curriculum and its process

In all departments, the syllabus is framed by the Board of Studies. The Board of Studies comprises of two subject experts from reputed neighboring colleges, nominee from Bharathidasan University and a industrial representative. The board also includes an alumnus with ample experience in the field. The curriculum is framed by the Board of studies keeping in mind the stipulations of Bharathidasan University and UGC. Accordingly modifications are made in the curriculum with focus on the carrier of the students. Usually, the Board of Studies is conducted once in two years and looks into following aspects

- > Preparation of syllabi as per the objectives of the Institution and scope of the subject concerned
- > Reviewing and updating the syllabi, question pattern and examiners panel.
- > Suggesting methodologies for innovative teaching and evaluation methods.

The revised syllabus is then presented in the Academic Council Meeting which comprises of professionals from other fields, academicians of other disciplines, advocates, and experts from industries. In Academic Council meeting, curriculum is discussed at length and breadth, the suggestions of the Academic Council members' are taken into consideration while restructuring the syllabus.

# 1.1.3 Involvement of stakeholders, industry, society and research bodies in the curriculum design and development process

Each Department consults with external experts, either nominated by the University or from nearby Colleges and makes the desirable changes in the curriculum. The college attempts to include members from varying backgrounds in the board of studies. External Experts from nearby colleges include NIT (Trichy), SASTRA, Alagappa University. They offer their rich experience in shaping the curriculum.

Students' feedback about the curriculum and college is collected regularly through Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). The College gives more emphasis to the students' feedback and seriously considers it while restructuring the syllabus. The college has a vibrant students association which discusses various issues of the college. Their feedback and suggestions are considered and incorporated while framing curriculum design.

The college has established good relationship with the communities located around the college through various extension activities. Their views and opinions are also given importance in the planning and revision of curriculum.

Arts, Humanities and Science Departments invite reputed experts / Speakers to deliver lectures at the Seminar / Workshop / Symposia in the premise and events of the nature also contributes to the enrichment of the Curriculum. Besides these, the teaching faculty also seek the opinion of experts from India and abroad with whom they have established tie ups and bring in suitable modifications. The inputs of Dr. D. Shanthana Lakshmi, Institute of Membrane Technology, IMT – CNR, Italy for Chemistry, J. Wilson, retired supervisor, Khadi Village Commission, Marthandam for Zoology are worth mentioning. Professor Yvette Kosmann Schwarzbach from Ecole Polytechnique , Paris and Prof. Bertram Schwarzbach, Paris delivered lectures when they visited the town as tourists and provided valuable suggestions towards the revision and up gradation of the syllabus.

# 1.1.5 How does College ensure that the curriculum developed address the needs of the society and have relevance to the regional / national developmental needs?

The college is situated in the granary of Tamil Nadu. Keeping this in mind, the Department of Chemistry has included a course entitled "Agricultural Chemistry".

- As the College is located in an agrarian area, "Location Specific Curricula" like "Bio Fertilizer Production" (2009-10) and "Organic Farming and Live Stock Management" (2011-12) were designed and implemented as certificate courses. The above two programmes were funded by UGC merged schemes and the certificates issued to the students have immense value in their pursuit of entrepreneurship.
- Field trips were also arranged to provide real time experience in the respective fields.
- ➤ The department of History provides the course titled "Epigraphy" in which the students are enlightened through various field trips and self investigations on the precious treasures of our fore fathers.

All the departments strictly follow the guidelines of the Academic council of the college which in turn follows the rules and regulations of UGC, Bharathidasan University and Tamil Nadu State Council for Higher Education (TANSCHE) and Academic Audit Committee for developing or restructuring the curriculum.

Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses. Under CBCS, flexibility is considered to be the prime concern in curriculum design. Keeping this in mind, the college leaves no stones unturned in offering the students various options to choose a spectrum of inter-

disciplinary courses. Even though offering inter-disciplinary programs remains the ultimate goal of the institution, the curriculum offers a glimpse of the interdisciplinary studies through major based electives.

From 2007 onwards, the college has started to offer Inter- disciplinary courses for both for UG and PG as indicated by the university regulations. From 2013 and 2014 the non major elective courses for masters have been altered to be major based electives. The department of history is conducting a certificate on tourism in which a great number of students from other subjects actively participate.

From 2012-13 a widely acclaimed move by the **Tamil Nadu** government is the "Study Abroad **Programme"** for faculty and students of lower economic and social background. The "Study Abroad Programme" is a fully funded scheme of Tamil Nadu State Government. It is a unique programme to support students from Government Colleges and Universities especially from the lower economic and social background across Tamil Nadu to study one semester in the U.K.

A first batch consisting of fourteen students' and three faculty members joined University of Birmingham, Edge Hill University, University of Nottingham and Royal Holloway University of London for s starting in September 2013. Ms. M. Anusya Nancy of PG & Research Department of Chemistry successfully completed all levels of screening tests conducted by TANSCHE for study abroad program and obtains herself a place in the University of Birmingham, Edge Hill University, U.K.

Even though attracting international students could be the ultimate aim of any higher education institution, the focus of this esteemed institution is limited to serving the students belonging to the marginalized section of the society as its vicinity.

### 1.2.3 Does the College offer dual degree and twinning programmes? If yes, give details.

To avoid two different unit cost of education in the institution between the self finance and Government aided programmes, at 2007, the Government converted all the self finance programmes into Government aided .

The curriculum is restructured periodically and Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) was introduced in all Departments in 2007-08 with 120 and 72 credits for the Under Graduate and Post Graduate's respectively. It was later revised as 140 and 90 credits in 2008-2009.

M.Sc. (Zoology) and M.A (Tamil) was started in 2012-2013 and 2013-2014 respectively.

In 2012-13, the Departments of English, Tamil, Chemistry, Zoology, Economics and History have been upgraded as **Research Departments** while the Departments of Mathematics and Commerce were elevated to research departments during 2013-2014. Thus Ph.D programmes in respective disciplines were started in the same year.

# 1.3.3 What are the strategies adopted for revision of the existing programmes? What percentage of courses underwent a major syllabus revision?

The existing programmes or the contents of the programmes are revised in such a way that it addresses the latest developments take place in the respective discipline. In this connection, the feedback collected from the students, alumni and the teaching faculty plays an important role. Suggestion offered by the externals experts either during Association meetings or during Seminar / Workshop add to the improvement of the curriculum.

### 1.4. Feedback

# 1.4.1 Does the College have a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students regarding the curriculum and how is it made use of?

The college takes a conscious effort to get feedback from the students. The process is coordinated between IQAC and the respective Departments. At the end of every semester, the teaching faculty obtain feedback from students. The feedback collected is then scrutinized by the Heads of the Departments and suitable remedial measure ( if necessary) are taken. The College has streamlined their mechanism of obtaining feedback from the stakeholders, namely students, alumni and parents since 2012-2013.

# 1.4.2 Does the College elicit feedback on the curriculum from national and international faculty? If yes, specify a few methods adopted to do the same - (conducting webinar, workshop, online forum discussion etc.). Give details of the impact on such feedback.

The Board of studies conducted once in two years facilitates the faculty to elicit the opinion of faculty / Lectures from nearby colleges on the curriculum and make suitable amendments. The conduct of Workshops / Seminars / Conferences in the premises since autonomy has helped the faculty to get an exposure to the recent trends in their respective discipliner. The IQAC in its agenda has mandated that the developments / Topics discussed in the Workshop should be incorporated suitably in the curriculum. Eventhough there exists no provision to attract international faculty within the realm of Government College, we do really hope that the tie ups of research Departments (like CeNSc and CAS) with national and international faculty will definitely contribute to an improved curriculum.

# 1.4.3 Specify the mechanism through which alumni, employers, industry experts and community give feedback on curriculum enrichment and the extent to which it is made use of.

Alumni meeting conducted every year provides a forum to elicit their feedback on the curriculum and make suitable modification, Feedback of the alumni is collected by the Old Student Association. Departments also conduct parent teachers meeting every year during which the expectations of the parents are recorded. The views of the industry expert / employers are taken into consideration in the Board of Studies and Academic Council.

# 1.4.4 What are the quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures undertaken by the institution in ensuring effective development of the curricula?

- ➤ The quality sustenance and enhancement are brought about either by the participation of the faculty in Conference / Seminar / Workshop / Orientation / Refresher courses outside the campus or by the organization of such events in the premises.
- > The faculty development programmes sponsored by UGC to pursue higher studies is another effort towards quality enhancement.
- ➤ In addition, popular lectures / talks arranged occasionally provide a Window for the faculty and students to update their Knowledge.

# 2 Criterion II: Teaching - Learning and Evaluation

## 2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

## 2.1.1 How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

- ➤ Soon after the publication of the results of the Higher Secondary examinations of Tamil Nadu State Board, CBSE and ICSE examination results, the sale of application starts. Submission of online application is also initiated .
- > Sale of application is announced through College web site and College notice board.
- > The single window system ensures transparency in admission.
- ➤ Till the completion of admission process, the admitted candidates and vacancy positions are displayed on the College notice board and also submitted to the Principal which ensures the transparency in admission.

# 2.1.2 Explain in detail the process of admission put in place for UG, PG and Ph.D. programmes by the College. Explain the criteria for admission (Ex. (i) merit, (ii) merit with entrance test, (iii) merit, entrance test and interview, (iv) common test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (v) others followed by the College?

Student admission process is strictly followed by the norms and guidelines prescribed by the State Government and Bharathidasan University. Application forms for admission including the prospectus are issued by the College office. The prospectus gives all the necessary information about admission rules like eligibility criteria, intake capacity, reservation policy according to state government rules, dates of submission of application forms and other relevant information about the admission process.

- ➤ Cost free application forms are issued to SC/ST candidates.
- Filled in applications are received within 15 days from the date of issue of application. The acknowledgement card which contains information about counseling dates (admission for Special category is done on the first day of counseling and the remaining admissions are made on the following counseling dates based on the marks of the students ranging from the highest to the lowest) is sent back to the candidates.
- ➤ Admission Committee is constituted with Principal as the head and three senior faculties with one of them belonging to the SC community.
- ➤ Applications of eligible candidates are processed and based on the choice of subjects of the candidates, subject wise rank list is prepared by the office and handed over to the departments.
- A common rank list is also prepared for the use of the examination committee and Principal. The rank lists bear information like the candidate's name with initial, date of birth, community, cut off marks, and details under special category such as whether the candidate is physically challenged or a sportsperson or the daughter of ex-service man. Admission is made strictly following the norms laid down by the State Govt of Tamil Nadu's reservation policy and merit of the candidate and availability of seats. Admission process is meticulously monitored by the Principal, the admission committee, the coordinators, HODs and the admission staff.

# 2.1.3 Does the College have a mechanism to review its admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an analysis and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

**Yes**, the college has a streamlined mechanism to review both the admission process and the students profile.

- At the end of each counseling day, the admission staff in charge of each department has to submit the vacancy position with the details of sanctioned strength and number of students admitted to the admission committee. The committee will analyze the reports and take necessary measures to fill up the vacancies on the next counseling day and also give the norms for admissions on the same day.
- ➤ Once the admission is completed, the complete database is created from the data collected from all the departments by the admission clerk in charge. The Principal and the admission committee analyze the number of candidates applied and admitted in the undergraduate and Post Graduate programmes and identify the high demand courses. The departments whose programmes are in high demand are considered to get the increasing seats. The departments with very low demand are directed to take extra measures to enhance their enrolment.
- ➤ Based on such analysis, the sanctioned strength of departments with high demand was increased with the approval of the university.

# 2.1.4 What are the strategies adopted to increase / improve access to students belonging to the following categories

## SC/ST

- ➤ Cost free application forms are issued to SC/ST candidates.
- ➤ 19% Reserved for SC/ST.
- > SC (A)/ ST vacancies are kept vacant till the last day of the
- Admission. In case candidates belonging to this category do not turn up, the vacancies are filled up with SC candidates.
- ➤ Reduced fees structure for the SC/ST students encourages more number of candidates to enroll.

- > SC (A)/ ST candidate's applications are accepted even after the deadline for submission of applications. These candidates are allowed to submit applications even on the last day of admission and admission is given to them provided there is availability of seats.
- > ST/SC scholarships sponsored by government to enable marginalized (SC, ST) pursue higher education.

## **OBC**

- ➤ 50% [30% BC and 20% MBC/DNC] reserved for OBC.
- > BC and MBC scholarships are sponsored by the Government of Tamil Nadu is given.
- ➤ Reduced fees structure for the BC/MBC students encourages more number of candidates to enroll.

### Women

- As an all women college, the College has always a high demand for admission. The condition to deploy strategies for increasing the number of applications never arises.
- To provide higher education to more number of students, Shift II is started.
- For the same reason, sanctioned strength is increased by 30% with the consent from the parent University.
- ➤ Hostel facility is provided.

## Different categories of persons with disabilities

- ➤ 3 out of every 100 seats are reserved for differently -abled students in OC, OBC and SC/ST category of students.
- ➤ Differently-abled persons are given admission on the first day of admission.
- > Ground floor classrooms are allotted to physically challenged students.
- For visually challenged ,scribe facility is provided.

# **Economically weaker sections**

- Almost all the students admitted hail from the financially weaker section.
- > Scholarships are given to help them financially.
- For more than 50 students, free lunch is provided.
- ➤ Book Bank with text books is available in all department libraries and students can use it without spending money on textbooks
- Free bus service from the bus stand to the College is arranged in co operation with the Tamil Nadu Transport Corporation.

## Outstanding achievers in sports and extracurricular activities

- > 3% of the total strength earmarked for students who excel in sports.
- The incentives offered to sports persons lures the students towards higher education.



### 2.2. Catering to Student Diversity

# 2.2.1 Does the College organize orientation / induction programme for freshers? If yes, give details of the duration of programme, issues covered, experts involved and mechanism for using the feedback in subsequent years.

- ➤ On the reopening day, the Principal addresses the newcomers and introduces the Controller of Examinations, the Librarian, PD and the HODs of all the departments and also lists the facilities available in the College. She also assures the students that there is no ragging in the College
- > The newcomers are accorded a grand welcome by the senior students and the faculty in their respective departments.
- ➤ The Heads of each department clearly explain the rules and regulations followed in the College, academic activities, welfare scheme for students and other extension activities.
- ➤ The staff in each department explains to the new comers the CBCS system of examination, internal assessment system and conduct and evaluation process of examinations, day order system and leave rules.
- ➤ The Department of English conducts Bridge Course on Communication Skills for the newcomers.
- ➤ One working day is earmarked for newcomers.

# 2.2.2 Does the College have a mechanism through which the "differential requirements of student population" are analyzed after admission and before the commencement of classes? If so, how are the key issues identified and addressed?

Most of the students admitted hail from rural areas and have completed their school education in the regional language (Tamil Medium). So ,the students are given Bridge Course in English. As the tutorial system is in practice, the ward tutors in their first meeting with their students identify their various requirements and submit their reports to the principal through the Heads of the Departments and the Principal takes action.

The ice breaking session which is an eye opener gives the class in charge opportunity to know about the different levels of the students and act accordingly.

### 2.2.3 Does the College provide bridge /Remedial /add - on courses? If yes, how are they structured into the time table? Give details of the courses offered, department-wise/faculty-wise?

Yes. The College provides the Bridge Courses and Remedial Courses and add-on course.

- Majority of the students are from Tamil medium schools situated in rural areas. In order to improve their communication skills and writing skills in English, Grammar, the Department of English conducts a bridge course for the newcomers.
- Remedial coaching is given to slow learners/SC/ST students and non creamy layer of students.
- Remedial classes are given after the regular class hours. In the remedial classes, students are trained in Section A of the question paper.
- Computer Literacy Programme lab also provides compulsory computer soft skill training to all non computer science UG students as a bridge course and a certificate is issued after successful completion.

# 2.2.4 Has the College conducted a study on the incremental academic growth of different categories of students; - students from disadvantaged sections of the society, economically disadvantaged, physically challenged and slow learners etc.? If yes, give details on how the study has helped the College to improve the performance of these students.

- The academic growth of individual students is continuously monitored by staff in charge of the class and also by the tutors. They observe the academic growth of all students with special attention to economically backward and differently abled students. The staff members maintain individual mark registers to record the continuous internal assessment of all students apart from the general mark register maintained in the Department.
- In the staff meetings convened by the Head of the Department, the performance of the students are reported, discussed and analysed.
- The outcomes arrived are represented by the Head of the Department in the college council for taking necessary actions to improve their performance. Few such actions taken were:
  - o The classes are arranged in the ground floor for the physically challenged students who are not able to attend the classes on the first and second floor for their convenience.
  - o Remedial courses were arranged for SC/ST/OBC non creamy layer students.
  - Special remedial courses were conducted in chemistry and English based on the results obtain in the previous semester
- These actions taken had improved the pass percentage.

### 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to the learning needs of advanced learners?

- ➤ Advanced learners are identified by teachers through classroom interaction, tests, seminars, debates and assignments.
- ➤ They are encouraged to bag endowment prizes, proficiency prizes given by the college and University Ranks.
- ➤ Honouring the university rank holders in the assembly and on the College Day motivates the advanced learners to go places. Their names appear in the College Magazine and annual report.
- Motivating and guiding the students to apply for student mini-projects sponsored by TANSCHE and UGC.
- Availability of e-resources through INFLIBNET and Wi-fi accessibility inside the campus help them promote their knowledge in the respective fields.
- > Coaching and guiding the students for study aboard programme.
- ➤ Encouraging the students to participate in quiz competitions, essay writing, presenting papers in workshops/seminars within and outside the College campus.
- Advanced learner category Students are motivated to exhibit their creativity to publish articles in the College Magazine and other journals.
- ➤ They are given opportunity to develop leadership qualities by assigning them the duties of Class Representatives, Association President, Secretary and Office Bearers in Students Union.
- They are given merit scholarships from UGC BSR grants.
- ➤ Provision of space to score extra credits through self study papers is going to be introduced in the academic year 2015-16.
- ➤ Coaching for SET, NET examinations and Entry in Services are given in the College with experts from outside.

## 2.2.6 How does the institution cater to the needs of physically challenged students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

- ➤ 3% is reserved for physically challenged students in OC, MBC/DNC and SC/ST category of students.
- > Scribes are provided to visually challenged students in examinations.
- The classes are arranged in the ground floor for the physically challenged students.
- > Providing extra half an hour in exam hours.
- > Guidance and motivation through Equal Opportunity Centre

### **Academic Calendar**

The College follows a well planed Hand Book cum Academic Calendar prepared for every academic year by the Principal in consultation with the council members. At the beginning of every academic year, the Calendar is given to the students. **The Calendar contains the following details**

### **Teaching Plan**

Teaching hours are stipulated according to the course contents of each paper. Day order system is followed. Time table is prepared for individual departments and also for whole College. Individual staff time table is also prepared. Students are evaluated by conducting class tests, continuous assessment exams and model exams. Examination schedule is given well in advance to the students. Individual staff members have a lesson plan and follow it exactly in order to finish the syllabus in time. The staff after finishing their syllabus submit syllabus completion report to the Heads of the Departments at the end of the semester.

#### **Evaluation Blue Print**

The basic evaluation blue print is given by the Controller of Examinations for calculating the CIA marks. Hence ,a centralized protocol is followed for evaluation. The 25 marks for CIA is distributed as 15 marks for CIA tests, 5 marks for assignments and seminars, 3 marks for model examination and 2 marks for attendance. This blue print gives room for self learning, team learning, and practice of using Library and web resources.

#### **Practical Marks**

In evaluating the practical examinations initially the marks were distributed as 25 for internal and 75 for external. Later, considering the role of practicals, the marks were redistributed as 40 for internal and 60 for external.

### 2.3.2 Does the College provide course outlines and course schedules prior to the commencement of the academic session? If yes, how is the effectiveness of the process ensured?

Yes. At the beginning of each semester, every department provides the syllabus booklet to the students which contains the course outline, syllabus and the credits of each paper. The Content of the Syllabus is available in the College Website. The Heads of the Departments and the other staff members prepare the Course schedule both for theory and practical for the students and it is also given to the students. The Heads of the Departments periodically monitor the implementation of the plan.

### 2.3.3 What are the courses, which predominantly follow the lecture method? Apart from classroom interactions, what are the other methods of learning experiences provided to students?

The lecture method is adopted in all the theory courses. But in addition to that, the following methods are also in practice to keep the students in their comfort zone of learning.

- 1. Assignments are made mandatory in all courses.
- 2. Student seminars are encouraged.
- 3. News paper cuttings are displayed on the notice board of all departments.
- 4. Through seminars, conferences and workshops and also the invited talks given by the experts provide a very good platform for learning experience.
- 5. Students are encouraged to use audio visual aids for their presentations.
- 6. The Department of Zoology and History enable real life learning experience through field trips.
- 7. Chart exhibition by students is arranged for every year.
- 8. Research scholars are invited to interact with the students and their ideas in the concerned core subject is shared with them so that students are updated on the latest/recent developments in the relevant subjects.
- 9. The use of Language laboratory and sharing of learning experiences are also some of the different Teaching-Learning strategies.
- 10. Power Point Presentations are used for teaching.
- 11. Quizzes are conducted in all the departments.

# 2.3.4 How is 'learning' made more student-centric? Give a list of participatory learning activities adopted by the faculty that contribute to holistic development and improved student learning, besides facilitating life-long learning and knowledge management

- > Science Laboratories, Library with reading hall, Audio visual aids, and computer with internet facility enable the students for independent and team learning.
- ➤ Department wise association activities such as quiz competitions, invited Lectures, exhibitions help the students to develop their creative skills
- ➤ Practical and demonstrations of the Curriculum adds to the imagination of the students learning skills.
- ➤ Introduction of application oriented papers provide them with additional theoretical knowledge.
- > Students are encouraged to participate actively in various seminars/workshops/Conferences.
- > The participation of students in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities helps them develop a wide knowledge.

- ➤ Every year, College Magazine is published by college. This provides space for students to display their critical and creative skills by their contributing poems, short stories, modern art etc.
- ➤ The Fine Arts Association of the College is very active and guides students to participate in dance, drama, and singing competitions and also in elocutions, essay writing, poem writing etc.
- ➤ The students are allowed to participate in the cultural events conducted in other colleges/institutions.
- ➤ Various journals related to different subjects are subscribed by library. The online resource UGC-INFLIBNET is also subscribed. The books and Journals are purchased by the College on a regular basis for knowledge upgradation.
- ➤ The students' participation in competitions like poster presentation, scientific display, model creation and display both within and outside the campus enables the learners to perform innovatively.
- The recent automation of the library helps the students further by giving access to them to a large number of journals / books and facilitates easy indentification of their requirements.
- ➤ The recent creation of NPTEL multimedia portal is another step towards students(learner) centric approach of the institution and the impact will be known in the coming years.

### 2.3.5 What is the College policy on inviting experts / people of eminence to provide lectures / seminars for students?

- Association meetings are conducted by all the departments for which experts in respective fields are invited to give lectures on current topics.
- > Subject experts are invited to deliver special lectures on focused areas at the time of seminars/workshops/conferences.
- Coaching programmes offered in Merged Schemes of UGC XI plan like SET/NET, and Entry in Services offer a perfect platform for interacting with experts from other colleges.

### 2.3.6 What are the latest technologies and facilities used by the faculty for effective teaching? Ex: Virtual laboratories, e-learning, open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

- The quadrangle and the seminar hall are Wi-Fi enabled. Seamless connectivity to internet with 100 concurrent users and their monitoring through Firewall enables the institution to offer technology centric education to the students.
- Launching of NPTEL multimedia portal, the first such initiative to have been taken up in a Govt. Arts and Science College in India.
- Training program in "Google Apps" is going to be offered in the coming academic year.
- Power point presentation is given.
- Students are trained in English Communication Skills in the Language laboratory
- The Internet facility available in all the departments is helpful to get access to virtual labs/e-learning (students get a chance to watch videos demonstration of scientific experiments, video lectures etc).
- As an affiliated college of Bharathidasan University (which is the first higher educational institution in the country to introduce Animal dissection free lab) the College has reduced the number of animal dissections with the help of visualizer and projector. and also the chordate specimens are completely replaced with virtual dissection software.
- Tamil Nadu Government has issued Free Laptops to all Undergraduate students who study in Government Colleges and Government aided Colleges. This scheme has facilitated computer enabled learning through which students assimilate knowledge

- and prepare their assignments, seminars and power point presentation.
- Computer Literacy Programme lab also provides compulsory computer soft skill training to all non computer science UG students as a bridge course.
- A smart class room with all modern facilities is available.
- Project works are mandatory to the PG students which give an opportunity in pursuing higher education.
- 2.3.7 Is there a provision for the services of counselors / mentors/ advisors for each class or group of students for academic, personal and psycho-socio guidance? If yes, give details of the process and the number of students who have benefited.

### **Tutorial Ward system**

- Each faculty is assigned with 20 students as wards.
- > The tutors collect all personal and family details of those students
- The Tutors constantly monitor the regularity of attendance, participation in seminars and other activities and also the performance of the students in internal tests/semester examinations through periodical meetings with their wards i.e. once in 15 days.
- The tutors give multi level guidance in academic, personal and psycho-socio problems. They will inform the parents about the wards whenever necessary.

### **Project Work**

- ➤ Project Work is mandatory for all the II PG students. At time of submission of the project, Viva Voce examination is conducted for which an external examiner is invited to evaluate the project and award marks. Project work introduces the students into the realm of research.
- ➤ Highly commended project works are recommended and forwarded to TANSCHE or TNSCST, for mobilizing resources.

#### **Career Guidance and Placement Cell**

- Placement cell provides various information regarding career opportunities to the students
- Coaching classes for Entry in Services for preparing students to face various competitive examinations were given. Soft Skill Training is given a large number of students.
- At the time of admission a special committee is constituted for guiding the students who seek admission to various courses offered in the college to choose programmes based on their interest and cut off marks.

### Personal and Psycho-social support

- In the ward tutor meetings, students' personal and psycho social needs are discussed and solutions identified.
- ➤ Women Cell addresses women related issues.
- > Students Counseling Centre is established to take care of personal and psycho-social problems of the students and suggest remedies to the problems.
- Training in Yoga, Stress management and various activities related to psycho-social problems are conducted through extension activities.
- Personal and Social Guidance are given through Grievance Redressing Cell.

# 2.3.8 Are there any innovative teaching approaches/methods/ practices adopted/put to use by the faculty during the last four years? If yes, did they improve the learning? Yes. The following facilities have been provided for the faculty to develop innovative teaching methods.

- The faculties are encouraged to make power point presentations in the class.
- ➤ The faculty is encouraged to attend seminars conferences and workshops on Internet Connection to all departments.
- ➤ Wi-Fi facility in the whole campus for all students and staff.
- ➤ With the help of the Language lab, the students' English com munication skills are developed for which the staff are trained.
- ➤ Various Workshop/Seminars have been organized to upgrade their knowledge levels.
- ➤ INFLIBNET facilities for online access to e-journals and e-books.
- A recent effort made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new innovative approaches is the introduction of interactive boards and this has led to an interactive participation of students.
- Faculties are encouraged to participate in Refresher programmes workshop, seminars and conference. The faculty members who attend such seminars/ conferences share their experience with students and faculty with latest information and talent developments.
- > Quiz competitions are conducted in association activities of all departments
- ➤ Submission of assignments and taking seminars are mandatory.
- These facilities encourage the faculty members to design innovative teaching tools. The impact of such teaching methodologies were assessed based on
- ➤ (1)Casual conversation with students by the HOD and other senior faculties help in assessing the innovative teaching techniques adopted by the staff.
- ➤ (2) the feedback received from students ,the head of the institution and the department come to know of the innovative teaching approaches/methods/ practices implemented by the staff.

### Role of the faculty in facilitating such projects:

- Project Work is mandatory for all the II PG students. The students are divided into minimal groups and each group is guided by a faculty from the department. First, the project adviser identifies the student's area of interest. Then she helps her ward in dtermining the problem/issue of investigation and also in finding out related resources. She guides the student at various levels like going through the project and correcting the entire contents of the project and suggesting a suitable title etc. And ,finally she also conducts a mock viva for her wards.



- ➤ Just before the conferment of college with Autonomy, a two day workshop was organized by the Academic staff college for all faculty to train them for curriculum development, Teaching Learning methods and evaluation process.
- ➤ Whenever there is a need for revising the syllabus, the IQAC organizes a faculty meeting and insists on the need for changing the curriculum on the basis of modern trend and at the same time location specific needs.

#### **Examination Reforms**

- Initially, the academic council decided to gave five marks for attendance to the students in calculating the internal assessment marks. This makes the students to come to college regularly and contribute a lot in their learning process.
- ➤ Once the attendance got regularized, then the academic council decided to reduce the marks for attendance to two and weightage was given more for model examinations. This made the students to take more efforts for the model exam and their performance in external examinations subsequently got improved.

### **Content / Knowledge Management**

Library was equipped well after the conferment of autonomy. Library was improved with the following facilities.

- Electronic library
- ➤ Subscription to UGC INFLIBNET Library access
- ➤ 10 Mbps Leased Line Fiber Optic Cable Network for Unlimited Internet Access across the whole campus during 2012-14.
- ➤ Software entitled **Dolphin's S\_LIPSINET** for library automation was purchased
- Database of General Library is created. A UGC Network Resource Centre with the local area network is established with 8 computers in the General Library. The network resource centre provides an easy access to internet to both the students and faculty within the College premises.
- ➤ The student and faculty can also take photocopies of the books and journals from the General Library.
- ➤ INFLIBNET-NLIST Programme: Our College was registered as a member in INFLIBNET-NLIST Programme from Oct 2012. Under this scheme, Staff members of our College were provided with a password for online accessing of more than 3000 e-Journals & more than 75,000 e-books.

- ➤ The College has a tutorial pattern where the tutors give necessary advice to their wards in the ward meetings.
- > Parent Teachers meetings.
- > Students are informed in the Assembly.

# 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms initiated by the College and to what extent have they been implemented in the College? Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the evaluation management system?

The college utilizes the autonomy to the maximum extent in improving the evaluation systems whenever possible. Some of the implemented reforms are

- ➤ The examination system is completely computerized. Data entry of Examination Applications, Students data, Examination schedule, seating arrangement, Attendance sheet, Central Valuation work, Results Board Meeting, preparation of course wise results, upload of the Semester Examination results in the College website, preparation of Marks Sheets, Revaluation and Supplementary examination results are computerized.
- A candidate failed in only one paper in any Semester of the course (UG and PG) is allowed to write the Supplementary Examination conducted within a month of the publication of results, and the results of Supplementary Examination will be declared within ten days.
- > The quality of central valuation has been enhanced by appointment of chief examiners for every 8 examiners.
- An external examiner is appointed for every day of the examination to examine the smooth conduct of examinations.
- > The quality and consistency of the questions papers are ensured by the arranging external faculty in the scrutiny of the question papers.
- ➤ The academic council decided to allot marks for attendance to the students while calculating the internal assessment marks. This made the students to come to college regularly.
- ➤ Once the attendance got regularized, then the academic council decided to reduce the marks for attendance to two and five marks was allotted to model examinations. This made the students to take more efforts for the model exam and their performance in external examinations got improved.
- > In evaluating the practical examinations initially the marks were distributed as 25 for internal and 75 for external. Later, considering the role of practicals, the marks were

- redistributed as 40 for internal and 60 for external.
- For making the students to give importance for attending the internal tests, a fine of Rs 100/- was collected in case they appear for retests.

## 2.5.3 What measures have been taken by the institution for continuous evaluation of students and ensuring their progress and improved performance?

Procedures for continuous evaluation of the students to ensure their progress are

- > Two CIA tests and one model examination are conducted as per the schedule.
- Five marks are allotted for assignments and seminars which improve their analytical and presentation skills.
- > Retests are arranged for absentees and participants in NSS, sports activities.
- > Evaluated papers are given back to the students and the results are discussed.
- ➤ Based on their performance, remedial classes are conducted for needy students.
- Parents are informed about students' progress through PTA meetings.
- ➤ The evaluation process is published in the college calendar and the tentative dates are given in it. The details regarding the dates are put up in the notice board and circulated to the Heads of the departments and in turn, the tutors intimate their wards.

### 2.5.4 What percentage of marks is earmarked for continuous internal assessment? Indicate the mechanisms strategized to ensure rigor of the internal assessment process?

- ➤ 25% of the marks are earmarked for Continuous Internal Assessment and 75% of marks are for Semester examination.
- The Continuous Internal Assessment is conducted by tests, assignments, seminars.
- A centralized method is adopted in conduct of the CIA. The Timetable for the CIA are announced earlier and circulated to the students through the departments. A Department (in turns) takes the duty of allotting room and Hall superintendents for the internal examinations. The invigilators collect the question paper, conducts the examination and handover the answer papers to the respective departments.
- The valued answer sheets are distributed to the students and the papers are collected back with students' signature. The marks obtained by the students in each CIA are displayed on the Department notice board.

## 2.5.5 Does the College adhere to the declared examination schedules? If not, what measures have been taken to address the delay?

**Yes**, the College adheres to the declared examination schedule.

# 2.5.6 What is the average time taken by the College for declaration of examination results? Indicate the mode / media adopted by the College for the publication of examination results e.g., website, SMS, email, etc.

The results are declared within one month of the completion of the Semester examinations. The results are published in the college website. Mark statements are prepared Department wise and are distributed to the Departments. A copy of the same is displayed in the notice board of the COE office.

### 2.5.7 Does the college have an integrated examination platform for the following processes?

#### **Pre-Examination Processes**

- ➤ **Time table generation**: After receiving the filled up examination application forms from the students, the COE office prepares the general examination timetable for the college.
- ➤ **Student list generation**: Student list for every session room wise and subject wise are prepared by the COE office and handedover to the Department which is in charge of the conduct of the examinations. Seating arrangement is so made that no two candidates of the same Department sit near by.
- ➤ **Invigilators:** Based on the students list obtained from the COE office, the Department in charge of the conduct of examination arranges for such number of invigilators.
- > Squads: External squads are arranged for all the days of the conduct of examination to ensure the smooth conduct of examination and report any remarks( if any)..
- ➤ Attendance sheet: Attendance Sheet Hall wise is prepared and handed over to the Department conducting the examination.
- ➤ Payment of fee: Payment is made by the students on the respective dates which are announced earlier during which the bank provides an extension facility in the college to facilitate the students to pay the fees easier. Those students who fail to make the payment on these days have to approach the bank and make the payment with a fine of Rs. 100/-.

### **Examination Process – Examination Material Management, Logistics**

The question paper covers are opened by the chief superintendent in the presence of two hall superintendents 30 minutes before the examination hour. The answer sheets with College logo are issued with a specific seal for every session which is kept confidential. The invigilators assemble in a hall in which the answer sheets, question papers and the attendance sheet for the halls are handed over to the respective invigilators. An invigilator is appointed for every 30 candidates.

Hall allotment for the students is displayed in the notice board in which a student has to find out in which hall she has to write her examination. The student on reaching the hall should find out her respective seat number from the Seat Allotment displayed in front of the room and occupy that particular seat which she is allotted for. A student is allowed for examination only if she brings her Hall ticket and Identity Card with her. No candidate is allowed to write the examination if she is late for more than half an hour. After the examination is over, the invigilators collect the answer sheets and handover to the examination unit.

## Post Examination Process – Attendance Capture, OMR based exam result, auto processing, generic result processing and certification.

One external valuation is conducted for all UG programmes and double valuation (one internal and one external) is done for PG programmes. The answer sheets are allotted dummy numbers before valuation process. The coding and decoding system of Answer Scripts is implemented to hide the identity of the students to the evaluators.

The central valuation is also done by a Department (in turns) with a team of one Camp Officer and two Additional Camp Officers. A chief examiner is appointed for every 10 examiners. The marks along with the dummy numbers are handed over to the COE office which arranges for the processing of result publication.

The results are being discussed with the Result awarding committee before its publication.

### 2.5.8 Has the College introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

The evaluation process for Ph.D.is stipulated by the parent university (Bharathidasan University) The respective department convenes a doctoral committee meeting before submission of synopsis. A foreign examiner and an Indian Examiner evaluate the thesis and a public Viva Voce examination is conducted with the examiner being nominated by the University.

# 2.5.9 What efforts are made by the College to streamline the operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations? Mention any significant efforts which have improved process and functioning of the examination division/section?

- The amount of exam fees, their payment schedule, model exam and end semester exam dates are planned ahead by the examination committee.
- The result awarding committee meets to analyze the results before the publication of the results.

### 2.5.10 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation?

- Retotalling and revaluation of semester examination papers on request by the students enables the students to get their grievances redressed. After the release of the results, the students could apply for revaluation within 10 working days of publication of results.
- Supplementary exams are conducted at the end of the final semester in which those candidates who have only one arrear in any one of the semesters can appear.

### 2.6 Student performance and Learning Outcomes

### 2.6.1 Does the College have clearly stated learning outcomes for its programmes? If yes, give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

**Yes**. Learning outcomes are clearly stated for each course while the course content is prepared and then it is passed through the Boards of studies and Academic Council. A copy of the course contents with the learning outcomes is made available to the students and each faculty members for their reference.

### 2.6.2 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The following strategies help monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes.

- > Students' feedback is considered as the main bench mark for computing the learning outcomes.
- The CIA marks, assignment marks and the efficiency in taking seminars are also considered to evaluate the learning outcomes. The teachers identify the slow learners and conduct remedial coaching/extra coaching.
- Additional credits for advanced learners.
- Motivation for rank holdersContinuous internal test and
- > Continuous internal test and end semester examinations results are analyzed
- Student's placement records and progression to higher studies also substantiate the achievements of effective learning outcomes.

## 2.6.3 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it for overcoming barriers of learning?

- Through regular class tests and CIA examinations, the learning outcome of students is collected and the data is analyzed and necessary remedial measures are taken to get the students ready for the semester examinations.
- Based on their performance in the Semester Examinations ,they are given special coaching and they get through the Semester Examinations.
- Ward tutor meetings & reports play a vital role in this regard.
- Feed back system is in practice. It helps in identifying students' difficulties in the learning process. Necessary action is taken based on the feed back of the students.
- Personal, social and economic factors which affect the learning process of the students are also identified by conducting Ward Tutor Meetings and Parents –Teachers Meeting. Based on their requirements, counteractive measures are taken.

#### 3.1 Promotion of Research

As per the stipulations of Bharathidasan University, Departments which have been recognized (by Bharathidasan University) and permitted (by Govt. of Tamil Nadu) to offer Full time/Part time research programmes are monitored by a Departmental Research Committee (**DRC**). The Departmental Research Committee (**DRC**) comprises of the Head of the Department (HOD) occupying the role of the chairperson and other approved research supervisors. If the HOD is not an approved research supervisor, he/she shall nominate the senior most research supervisor as the chairperson of the DRC. The research programmes of the institution are monitored by a Research cell which comprises of senior most research supervisor in the institution. Some of the recommendations of the research cell are the following.

- To scrutinize the validity or eligibility of the research proposals submitted by the Faculty.
- Presenting a seminar every year for full time research scholars has been made mandatory.
- To encourage the faculty to apply for
  - i. Sponsored research projects.
  - ii. Travel support for attending conference abroad
  - iii. Book grant
  - iv. Organizing Seminar/ Workshop / Conference
- To create an awareness among the faculty on obtaining citation index, h-index etc.
- To encourage the students apply for student projects funded by TANSCHE, TNSCST, etc.,

## **3.1.4.** What are the proactive mechanisms adopted by the College to facilitate smooth implementation of research schemes / projects?

The principal investigators enjoy the rare privilege of full autonomy from the institution to the extent of utilizing 100% of money allocated under "Overhead Charges". This gesture has come in handy for enhancing the infrastructure of research centres like Centre for Nonlinear Science (CeNSc) which has earned its reputation at the international/national level. Another research centre entitled "Centre for Animal Studies (CAS) sponsored by UGC is squeezing its way through.

- Whenever there is a delay in the release of grants from the funding agency, the institution has come forward to support the research scholars financially through the money generated from internal resources like Parent Teacher Association.
- As soon as the college receives funds from the sponsoring agencies, the grants are immediately released to the principal investigators upon submission of bills/receipts. The research scholars receive the salary on the last working day of every month like a Government employee.
- The institution makes a conscious effect to audit the bills submitted by the PIs and submit the utilization certificates to the sponsoring agencies at the earnest.

The coming together of different Departments on a common platform to conduct seminar / symposia / school has enabled the students of different departments to interact with other and identify interdisciplinary areas of research. (Please see the table below)

Centre for Animal Studies (CAS) which is focusing its attention on the medicinal/pharmaceutical benefits of cow urine has already reached out to the society by conducting Workshops / Symposia. Centre for Nonlinear Science (CeNSC) which is investigating the dynamics of ultracold atoms to trace the origin of Universe since Big Bang has published more than 30 papers in international journals in the last five years and the impact of these results will be known in the years to come.



UGC –Network resource centre with a LAN of 10 PCs accommodated in the general library cater to the requirements of PG students and researchers from 9am-5pm.

Right now, there is no residential/hostel facilities to research scholars. There are around 15 full time research scholars in the institution at present and all of them are either local students or hail from nearby villages. The research culture is slowly creeping into the routine of the college and we are planning to submit proposals to the Govt. of Tamil Nadu to build a Hostel for accommodating research scholars.

3.3.4 Does the college have a specialized research centre / workstation to address challenges of research programmes? If yes, give details.

Right now, the college has not yet set up a specialized research centre to address the challenges of research programmes. However, the research programmes are coordinated by a forum called "Research Cell" which gives an opportunity to the research scholars to address their needs / requirements.

3.3.5 Does the college have research facilities (centre, etc.) of regional, national and international recognition / repute? Give a brief description of how these facilities are made use of by researchers from other laboratories

The Centre for Nonlinear Science (CeNSc) established in the 2005 under the auspices of DST has earned its own reputation and has established tie ups with institutes in India and abroad (Please see the table 3.7.1). CeNSc has already completed 4 major and 1 minor research projects sponsored by DST (2), DAE-NBHM (1) and UGC (1 Major & 1 Minor) while there are three ongoing research projects funded by DST, DAE-NBHM and CSIR. CeNSc boasts of facilities which are as good as one comes across at Institute of Mathematical Sciences (IMSC) which is a joint initiative of Department of Atomic Energy (DAE) and National Board of Higher Mathematics (NBHM) at Chennai. The faculties at CeNSc are utilized by research scholars of Bharathidasan University and SASTRA. Dr.R.Radha, Director, CeNSc is one of the eight recipients of the prestigious research project sponsored by CSIR for Physical Science in the year 2015 this underscores the recognition accorded to CeNSc at the National Level.

#### **Study Abroad Programme**

Tamil Nadu State Council for Higher Education (**TANSCHE**) has introduced the concept of "Study Abroad Programme" for the benefit of PG students and staff of Govt. College. In this connection, **TANSCHE** has signed a MOU with Universities and Colleges in United Kingdom. By virtue of this programme, PG students of all disciplines except Computer Science and English can spend a maximum of 3 months in a University/College/Research Lab in United Kingdom and engage them in collaboration .This programme which is sponsored by the State Govt. of Tamil Nadu has become a boon to the rural students to get an exposure to higher education in Foreign countries. Ms. Nancy M.Sc., (Chemistry) was selected under this programme in the year 2013-14 and visited the **University of Birmingham** for three months.

#### 3.7.2 Mention specific examples of, how these linkages promote.

#### Research

The linkage with institutes in India and abroad has enabled CeNSc to establish its reputation and identity in the field of nonlinear dynamics /condensed matter physics. CeNSc has produced 30 international publications in the last five years and these results have been cited by researchers all over the world.

#### Consultancy

**Dr.R.Radha, Director, CeNSc** has been bestowed with a rare opportunity of **peer reviewing several national and international journals** by virtue of the linkage with institutes in India and abroad.

3.7.3 Does the college have MoUs nationally /internationally and with institutions of national importance/other universities/industries/corporate houses etc.? Even though the college has not signed any MOU with institutes officially, CeNSc and CAS have entered into thriving research collaboration with several leading Universities in India and aboard. (Please see table in 3.7.1)

### 4 Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

# **4.1.1** How does the College plan and ensure adequate availability of physical infrastructure and ensure its optimal utilization?

#### Infrastructure

The College is located in a sprawling area of 14.15 acres of land protected on all sides with compound walls. The total plinth area of the College buildings is 4964.18 sp.mts. The College Buildings are maintained by the civil and electrical wings of the Public Works Department. Total number of buildings is 13 and they are

The two storied Main Block accommodates the Principal's room, Administrative Office, 8 class rooms and six laboratories. The first floor has 7 class rooms, 7 laboratories, the Main Library, Office of the Controller of Examinations, Computer Literacy Programme Laboratory, Language Laboratory and IQAC room. The second floor of the Main Building has 10 class rooms and a Seminar Hall.

The two storied Entrance Side Block (ESB), built in a plinth area of 1026.66 sq.mts, has 5 class rooms in the ground floor and 5 class rooms in the first floor and two class rooms in the second floor.

The two storied Commerce Block has a plinth area of 1540.77 sq.mts and it has totally 15 class rooms, 5 class rooms in each floor.

Moopanar Building and Siva Building have 4 class rooms each. Mani Shankar Iyer Building has 2 class rooms. PG Shed I is used by the PWD and Shed II has 2 class rooms.

The Central Library of the College is located on the first floor and it has a total number of 42,218 books, 28 journals, 19 Periodicals and 7 dailies. It also has access to 97,000 e-books through NLIST and 10,000 through College Intranet , 6,000 e-journals and digital data base. It provides internet access to students with a Local Area Network (LAN) of 8 computers. The Library is equipped with Copier, Inverter and UPS facilities. Apart from the General Library , each department is having its own library which has sufficient number of books for study, reference and circulation.

Most of the Departments have a Separate staff room with a rest room, and drinking water facility. All Departments are provided with computers and internet facility. Wi – Fi facility is provided

in the main building of the college for the benefit of the faculty members, students and research scholars.

Solar facility is available in the administrative office, Principal's room and in the Controllers's room. Six 100Ah HBL batteries attached with 4KW inverter provide back up power to the office and Principal's room and two 100 ah HBL batteries attached with 1KW inverter energize the Controller office.

A Separate Well furnished, air Conditioned Wi – Fi enabled seminar hall of area 1526 Sq.Ft with electronic podium, White board , LCD Projector, interactive devices, public address system and other sufficient amenties is available .Seminar hall is equipped with audio visual facility and a portable generator.

The Computer laboratory with 80 terminals owned and managed by the government under Computer Literacy Programme (CLP) is transferred to the College Administration. This is used to teach the non - computer Students to learn the basics of Computers to make them computer Literate.

Separate Lab Facilities for B.Sc and M.Sc students are provided in the Department of Computer Science. There are 39 PCs in the UG Lab and 31 PCs in the PG Lab. Other Facilities like LCD Projector, Digital Visualizer, 40" HDTV and Mobile speech Amplifier are provided. PCs are networked through LAN . Two Systems with Broadband internet Connection are made available to the students and staff members.

The Computers and other sensitive Equipments are provided with UPS so that the Power failure will not cause any damage.

Lab with UV- Visible Double beam spectro Photometer (Systronics), Muffle furnace(Labline), Auto clave (Labline), Water Analyser (Systronics), Muffle furnace (Labline), Water Analyser (Systronics) and Single stage distillation unit (River – Make) facilities are made available for chemistry Students.

Amenities like Lyophilizer, Automatic microplate reader, Deep freezer, Orbital shaking insulator, refrigerated Cooling high speed centrifuge. UV Visible spectrophotometer, Laminar Airflow, Trinocular Microscope and PCR are offered to the Zoology Students in Zoology Lab.

In Physics Lab, Constant temperature bath, LCD projector, Overhead Projector, Ultrasonic Interferometer, ESR Spectrometer and Generator facilities are available.

Language lab has been established to impart communication skills to all the students.

Geography Department Provides Land Form Model, Over Head Projector and Digital Camera facilities to the Students.

The College has an expansive playground field in 2.50 hectares of land for Sports and games. A Mini – gym facility with 9 stations was added in 2003 with the help of which lifting and Power lifting is offered to the students. The College has a Well equipped indoor auditorium for practicing indoor games. It has a Ball Badminton Court, a Basket Ball Court, a Kabaddi Court, a Kho – Kho court, a Tennis Court, a Volley Ball Court, a Football Field and Hockey Field.

Closed Circuit Television has been set up inside the College Campus to monitor the Students entering the campus and to prevent outsiders from entering the college premises. Cameras are mounted in seven vantage points.

The College has a separate RO system to ensure purified water supply for sudents and faculty. It helps our students in getting protected potable water. Intercom facility is available to connect all the departments with the principal's room and the administrative office which ensures easy tramsmission of communication.

A Public Address System is used to pass on information to staff and students at the time of emergency in the college.

Canteen facility is provided to staff members and students of both Shift - I and Shift II. Canteen is situated in a separate block.

Day care Centre is accommodated in the Ground floor of the Commerce Block. It has a separate room for the children of both students and staff. The windows of the room are fitted with mosquito net. Electrical appliances like Grinder, Fridge, Mixer and Induction Stove are available. Separate lavatory is provided to the Day Care Centre. There are many attractive and latest toys for the Children to play like swings, See – Saw and toy car etc., Chart bearing the letters of alphabets, fruits and vegetables, daily habits are displayed on the walls of the crèche

# 4.1.2 Does the college have a policy for creation and enhancement of Infra structure in order to promote a good teaching-learning environment?

#### If yes, mention a few recent initiatives.

Yes. The college has a policy for creation and enhancement of infrastructure in order to promote a good teaching-learning environment in the campus.

The Heads of the Departments hold discussions with their faculty members and prepare the list of requirements. This is then subsequently submitted it to the Principal to be forwarded to the Government for renewing the infrastructure.

To point out a few, some of recent initiatives being taken are the following.

- ➤ Under **Self Sufficient Scheme**, Fifty Lakhs from the Autonomous Examination Fund was contributed which when combined with One Crore allotment from the District Collector, Thanjavur has set in motion the process of construction of a new block with 15 class rooms.
- ➤ Centre for Animal studies has been established for the benefit of research students. Digital weight balancer, Cooling centrifuge, Elisa plate reader (Micro plate reader), Lyophilizer, UV–Visible spectrometer, Bacteriological Incubator, Deep freezer, Laminar air hood facilities are provided in the centre.
- ➤ The Language Lab was enhanced with seating facility of 50 members. There are 10 terminals. It is air-conditioned. Amenities like Epson LCD Projector, DVD player with amplifier, Creative A300 Speaker, Creative A35 speaker and Image King IK 218 Head Phones are available.
- ➤ New Physics and Chemistry laboratories are constructed.
- Interactive e-Board and Electronic Podium, Digital Visualizer have contributed to our smart class room initiatiive.

# 4.1.3 Does the college provide all departments with facilities like office room, common room, and separate rest rooms for women students and staff?

There is a common Office room with Scanner, Copier and Printer Facilities. Prayer hall and separate rest room facilities—are available for students and faculty members. There are 6 lavatories in the main building and 14 lavatories in the Commerce building, 7 in each floor for students and staff.

# 4.1.4 How does the College ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students/staff with disabilities?

The students with disabilities are given classroom space in the ground floor of the respective departments. A ramp facility is afforded in the Commerce department and in the main building. Apart from that, western lavatory is offered in the Commerce department. Canteen is situated in the ground floor for easy mobility of students..

4.1.5 How does the College cater to the residential requirements of students?

Mention Capacity of the hostels and occupancy (to be given separately for men and women)

Recreational facilities in hostel/s like gymnasium, yoga center, etc.

Broadband connectivity / Wi-Fi facility in hostel/s.

Hostel facilities are provided for women Students. A total number of about 238 students have been accommodated is 36 rooms in ground floor and first floor. One senior staff member is appointed as deputy warden and other two staff members as residential tutors to take care of students. There is a separate hostel for students belonging to Backward class, Most backward class, Scheduled caste maintained by Government.

#### **Facilities available in the Hostels:**

- ➤ Dining hall with a seating capacity of 180 students.
- There is a library accommodating 186 books to improve the knowledge of the students.
- > Indoor game items like netball, Ring ball, chess, carom, badminton, throw ball, shuttle cock etc.
- For the welfare of the students, eight senior students have been elected to monitor the activities of the students. Any grievance among the students is brought to the notice of the Deputy warden there by helping the students to solve the problems.
- > Purified water is used for drinking purpose. Hot water supply is also given during the winter season and rainy season.
- ➤ Solar facility is also available in the hostel..

# 4.1.6 How does the College cope with the health related support services for its students, faculty and non-teaching staff on the campus and beyond?

- The college has been periodically arranging health check-up camps, blood test camp, eye camp through extension activities and other voluntary organizations.
- First Aid Box is available both in the college and hostel campuses.
- A Gymnasium is available in the college.
- ➤ The medical insurance scheme of Government of Tamil Nadu is extended to all the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college. Medical leave is sanctioned to the needy staff members. In addition to this, the women staff and students are also granted maternity leave

# 4.1.7 What special facilities are made available on the campus to promote interest in sports and cultural events?

#### **Facilities available to promote interest in sports:**

➤ Sports and Cultural events which are included in Part – V has been made mandatory for UG Students.

- > Sports and Games play a crucial role in maintaining the physical fitness of students. The college provides plentiful facilities for the students to participate in sports activities.
- ➤ The facilities are provided for the outdoor games such as 200 meters Track, Hockey, Football, Netball, Ball Badminton, Basket Ball, Volley Ball, Kabadi, Kho-Kho. The facilities are also provided for the indoor games such as, Carom, Chess, Table Tennis, Shuttle and Weight-lifting. The sportsmen make use of the Multi-Gymnasium available in the campus, to keep them fit, healthy and energetic. A special coaching is provided to sports students by expert coaches.
- ➤ Our students have participated in inter-collegiate competitions conducted at Bharathidasan University and have brought laurels to the college by winning prizes and medals

#### Facilities available to promote interest in cultural events:

The fine Arts Association, is being taken care of by two faculty members and it plays a major role in identifying the inherent artistic talents of students, selecting and training them for participation in various cultural events. Our students have participated in various inter-collegiate competitions conducted at University and State levels and have brought glory to the college by winning prizes and medals in various events like Mime, Folk Dance, Solo Singing, Quiz, Western Dance, Variety Show, Rangoli, The students also exhibit their skills in the cultural programmes conducted during Annual Day, Alumni Meet etc, in the college.

### 4.2. Library as a Learning Resource

# 4.2.1 Does the library have an Advisory Committee? Specify the composition of such a committee what significant initiatives have been implemented by the committee to render the library, Student/user friendly?

**Yes**. There is an advisory committee consisting of the Principal as chairman, the Librarian, a senior staff as convener, a few other faculty members, and student representatives.

- The committee, which meets once in a year, discusses and finalizes the academic requirements of the library.
- ➤ The student members and the faculty members offer their suggestions / views on the purchase, availability and distribution of books to the stakeholders. Text Books, Journals, Magazines, CDs, periodicals and other materials are purchased and kept in the open shelves facilitating free access to staff and students.

- The committee gives guidelines for the procurement of costly books, internet journals, hardware and software necessary for the library.
- ➤ Library ID Card is provided to all students.
- > Separate day for Arts & Science Students to receive and return books.



- ➤ To enhance the methodology of teaching, the teachers prepare their own power point presentations, questionnaires', quiz and group discussion topics in their respective subjects. To facilitate this process, LCD Projectors, HDTV, Digital Visualizer and Mobile Speech Amplifier are provided; Digital Interactive Board is made available in Seminar Hall.

# 4.4.1 Does the College have an Estate Office/designated officer for overseeing maintenance of buildings, classrooms, and laboratories? If yes, mention a few campus specific initiatives undertaken to improve the physical ambience.

**Yes.** The maintanance of buildings including class rooms and laboratories are undertaken by the Technical Division Wing of Public Works Department (PWD). Some of the specific initiatives undertaken recently includes repair of toilets and drainage, electrical wiring of seminar hall, carpentry, plumbing and painting of buildings.

# 4.4.2 Does the college appoint staff maintenance and repair? If not, how are the infrastructure facilities, services and equipment maintained? Give details.

No. The College Infrastructure facilities such as Civil and Electrical works are maintained by Public Works Department (PWD). The following facilities are available in the college.

- The garden and campus maintained by gardener and sweepers funded by PTA.
- A Gymnasium is available in the college. The Department of Physical Education has a Gym with 9 stations by which practice for weight lifting and power lifting is offered. All power activities for leg, hands, abdomen and hip can be practiced. The Existing facilities have been utilized by the students which are maintained by Physical Education Department.
- A Day Care Centre has been established within the premises of the college to take care of the kids of the teaching/non-teaching faculty and students of the college. A care taker is appointed and paid from the contributions obtained from the beneficiaries. Day Care Centre was maintained by two senior staff members.

# 5. Criterion V: Student Support and Progression

### 5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

# 5.1.1 Does the College have an independent system for student support and mentoring? If yes, what are its structural and functional characteristics?

The Vision and Mission of the College is focused on moulding /grooming the students as good citizens of the country, transforming and empowering them to be competent and capable of taking up the challenges offered by the global market and the society as well. The student mentoring and support services offered in this institution are given below.

### **Mentoring System:**

- The admission committee along with the other staff steers the students to select their right choice of subjects at the time of admission.
- ➤ The freshers are received with an inormal orientation programme in which they are introduced to all the student support services and facilities so that they can avail them in the college campus.
- A well structured Tutorial Ward system enables the students face the difficulties in their academic, social and familial environments. One faculty takes up the responsibility of mentoring 20 students. As most of the students hail from rural, uneducated and socio economic backward family background, they have lot of constraints in their studies. Hence, the role of teachers in mentoring the students to complete their academic commitment is high. They also take care of identifying eligible students for scholarships and facilitate them to to receive the same. Teachers who can move well among the students and with good experience are usually allotted as the tutor for the freshers. Tutorial ward meetings are held frequently and the minutes are recorded in the ward register maintained by individual staff members. The minutes are duly signed by the tutor, Head of the Department and Principal.

#### **Student support services:**

#### **Grievance Redressel Cell**

Three senior faculty members constitute the Grievance Redressel Cell. A Grievance Redressel box is kept in the college main Building. It is opened regularly by the committee members and the letters are read confidentially and necessary action will be taken accordingly.

### **Student Counseling Cell**

Three senior faculty members who can interact well with the students constitute the Student Counseling Cell. They conduct meetings to address the general problems/issues faced by women in the society and offer necessary counseling.

#### **Career Guidance and Placement Cell**

One senior staff member will be the co coordinator for Placement and Career Guidance Cell. She is be assisted by two Assistant professors of Mathematics or Computer Science. They conduct motivtion camps, soft skill development programmes, training for communication skills. They also collect the student data base, shortlist and endorse the qualified students for campus interviews conducted in other colleges. Companies are invited and campus interviews conducted in the campus also.

### **Youth Development Scheme**

Three senior staff members along with a younger faculty constitute the committee. Through this scheme, youth development programmes are conducted.

### **Computer Literacy Programme**

All non computer science students are given computer training in this programme. A senior faculty will be the coordinator and the whole programme is monitored by the Head of the Department of Computer Science.

### **Entrepreneurship Development Cell**

Entrepreneurship Development is being offered by Economics Department. They are giving self employment training programmes like jewelry making, tailoring, embroidery and beautician courses.

#### **Students Welfare Committee**

The Department of Zoology fhas taken up the onus of initiating various activities coming under the purview of Students Welfare Committee since 2009 onwards. Students Welfare Committee provides free noon meal to the needy students of all departments who were identified by the tutors. The committee also takes care of the free bus pass facility offered by the State Govt.

### 5.1.2 What provisions exist for academic mentoring apart from class room work?

### **Remedial coaching Classes**

Slow learners are identified by the tutors and they are given special coaching classes, training in short answers and by providing question banks. The tutors take the opportunity to guide the students into making right choices regarding the elective and optional courses. The tutors recommend their deserving wards for different scholarships.

#### **Parents Teachers Meeting**

The parent teacher association of the college organizes parents-teachers meet once a year to evolve a rapport with the parents and to keep them informed of the academic progression of their wards. Apart from this, to keep parents informed of the student's marks and attendance, a mark statement with percentage of attendance is sent to them. Parents can also meet the faculty members after class hours to enquire about their children.

#### **Students Support – Services for hostel students:**

Residential Tutors who are living with residential students in the hostel are also lecturers at various departments and therefore act as mentors, facilitators for the residential students. They monitor their academic growth by studiously monitoring their study during the study hours in the evening and provide necessary counsel to them. They take care of the future of the wards and are available for interacting with the parents on days specified as visitor's day.

### Guidance and special coaching for competitive exams

The Placement Cell give pre-placement training in areas like resume writing, Jam sessions, GD skills, interview skills, numerical aptitude, critical and logical reasoning etc.

#### **Invited Lectures**

To supplement class room teaching, experts are invited for guest lectures, Seminars, Workshops and Orientations on subject related topics.

#### **Certificate courses**

- > Certificate courses and inter disciplinary papers add value to academic programmes.
- > Special academic assistance is extended in the form of facilitating students with **Extended lab** sessions beyond class hours

# 5.1.3 Does the College provide personal enhancement and development schemes for students? If yes, describe techniques employed e.g., career counselling, soft skill development, etc.

### **Career Counseling:**

The College has a Career guidance and Placement Cell whose activities are coordinated by a dedicated faculty member. All final year students are divided into groups and they are given preplacement training to equip them with the vital job skills. Pre-Placement training includes workshops on Career Guidance, Communication Skills, Resume building, Interview Skills, Group Discussions, Aptitude Training, Problem Solving techniques, Logical and Analytical reasoning etc.,. It also gives special guidance to pursue higher studies. Assistance is also rendered in preparing the students for competitive exams. The Cell has a well organized network with companies and nearby colleges.

# **Soft Skills Development:**

Soft Skills development being a major area in promoting global competencies, the college conducts Workshops/seminars/guest lectures on interpersonal skills, goal setting, team work, presentation skills, corporate skills, decision making, etc. Eminent resource persons are invited for motivational talks on personality development, communication skills and soft skills

### **Entrepreneurial Development**

Most of our students belong to socio-economic backward class and first generation learners. Hence ,as an effort to fulfill the Vision of the college in uplifting the poor and the needy students, the **Entrepreneurship Development Cell** was established to offer employable skills to the educated young rural women. # 6. Criterion – VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

### 6.1. Institutional Vision and Leadership

Government College for Women, Kumbakonam is the second Government College exclusively for women in the state of Tamil Nadu set up in the year 1963 with pre-university and Under Graduate programmes in Geography and History. The college was conferred the status of autonomy in the year 2007. Now, over the period of fifty years, the college has been developed as a Grade I college with 11 UG courses and parallel PG courses. Eight departments have been recognized as research centers. Admission of students to various programmes is governed strictly by the reservation policy of the State government thereby ensuring social justice. Our college has been serving the economically underprivileged sections of the society imparting competence and excellence in education to the young girls from rural background since its inception.

# 6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the college.

**Vision:** "Women Empowerment through Higher Education"

#### Mission:

- > To impart quality higher education to the students of socially and economically backward strata of the society.
- > To instill the spirit of research and orient aspiring young girls to achieve excellence in their respective fields.
- > To endow them with competence to face issues and challenges globally.
- > To create awareness among younger generation to protect environment.
- > To make them the torch-bearers of the age old tradition and rich culture of the land.

# 6.1.2 Does the mission statement define the college's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, college's traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.?

- As a women's college, the college addresses the needs of the less privileged women of the society by imparting quality education leading up to doctoral degrees. The college provides free education, bus pass, career guidance and placement opportunities with the financial assistance from the Central and State Governments.
- ➤ Vocational training and entrepreneurship development programs are conducted to encourage women become self employable and hence contribute to the economy besides becoming self reliant.
- > Students are motivated to participate in Seminars, workshops and conferences held at state level and national levels conducted by the college and also by the other colleges.
- > Situated at the banks of the river Arasalar, a tributary of Cauvery, our college is known for its lush green environment with plenty of trees and flower garden. Students and staff members are involved in maintaining the garden and protecting the natural environment of the college.
- > Tradition and culture are preserved by promoting students to participate in cultural activities like kollattam, karagatam, bharathanatyam and folk dances. Inter collegiate competitions are held every year in the memory of the first and founder Principal Mrs. R. Radha in promotion of traditional cultural activities.
- ➤ The college which has set its vision on women empowerment through higher education takes every conscious step towards achieving its goal.

# For ensuring the organization's management system development, implementation and continuous improvement:

The Council of the college which includes Principal, the Head of the institution and the Heads of all the 11 departments, the Librarian and the Physical Education Directress ensure the organisation's management, development, implementation and improvement. Periodical meetings of the Council and interactions with the faculty members in staff meetings, departmental staff meetings and various other committee meetings provide an opportunity for continuous improvement in the organisation's performance.

#### **Interaction with stakeholders**

- ➤ Once in every semester, parents-teachers meeting is conducted. Feed-back is obtained from parents for consideration.
- > Students' meetings are conducted at different levels. Ward meeting is conducted by tutors and representations are submitted to the Principal through the Head of the departments.
- Representation of Students in the Academic Council, Sports Committee, Hostel committee and various other committees and the interaction of the Principal with Union office bearers ensures that the stakeholders interests are taken care of.
- The core structure and syllabi for the various programmes are framed by discussions in the Board of Studies of the department which includes a University Nominee, two external subject experts, the faculty of the department, an industrialist and alumni. The syllabi are submitted to the Academic council which comprises of a panel of renowned experts in various fields like education, industry, medicine and law for approval.

# 6.1.4 Were any of the senior leadership positions of the College vacant for more than a year? If so, indicate the reasons.

Eventhough the post of Physical Education Directress has been vacant for more than five yearr, regular faculty members have taken up additional responsibility and ensure that the interests of the students are taken care of.

The college also ensures that whenever an incumbent faculty member retires or resigns, the senior faculty member in waiting takes over facilitating smooth transition in administration.

# 6.1.5 Does the College ensure that all positions in its various statutory bodies are filled and conduct of meetings at the stipulated intervals?

Yes. All positions of the various statutory bodies such as the Governing Body, the Academic Council, Board of Studies, and Finance Committee are filled and meetings are conducted within stipulated intervals.

# 6.1.6 Does the College promote a culture of participative management? If yes, indicate the levels of participative management.

The College ensures participative management at all levels. All decisions are taken in the Council meeting in which Heads of all the departments have discussions. The Heads of the Departments conduct periodic meetings with the faculty members and their suggestions are carried to the Council ensuring participation of every faculty member in the academic and administrative matters of the College.

Students are encouraged to participate in the College management through their union.

Representation of students in sports committee, Hostel Committee and Finance committee ensures that the welfare of the stakeholders are taken into the consideration promoting participative management.

# 6.1.7 Give details of the academic and administrative leadership provided by the University to the College.

The University nominates one subject expert for each department for framing the syllabi in the Board of studies. The modifications made are placed in the academic Council which comprises of experts nominated by the University to ensure that the institution implements the autonomous status in letter and spirit. The University provides administrative leadership to the college by nominating an expert in the governing body of the institution.

# 6.1.8 How does the College groom the leadership at various levels?

Various extension activities like NSS, YRC, Environmental Education, Leo Club, Red Ribbon Club, etc., provide a forum for grooming the leadership qualities of the students and nurture them become responsible citizens. Various committees like UGC committee, NAAC committee, Sports committee, etc., enable the teaching faculty to groom the leadership skills. The conduct of examinations and central valuation also hone the leadership skills of the teaching faculty.

### 6.1.9 Has the College evolved any strategy for knowledge management? If yes, give details.

The college adheres to the changes brought by the Tamil Nadu State Council for Higher Education. Besides the core courses, the students gain knowledge of related subjects by taking up allied courses, elective courses and non-major courses from other departments. The College has a library with more than 42,000 books and 29 journals. INFLIBNET-NLIST is enabled through internet to access 5000 journals and 75000 e-books. Wi-Fi enabling of the main campus and deployment of NPTEL multimedia portal with 250 courses contribute to knowledge management and enrich learning resources of the institution.

### 6.1.10 How are the following values reflected in various functions of the College?

### **Contributing to national development**

- ➤ The students of the College widely participate in extra curricular activities such as National Service Scheme, Youth Red Cross, Rotaract, Red Ribbon Club, Environmental Education, etc. Every year NSS students conduct camps in neighbouring villages for the upliftment of that area. Many awareness programmes are conducted every year. Blood donation camp, Cancer awareness rally, etc are being conducted.
- > The Sports students of our college participate at the national level every year.

A legal counseling is rendered in the College premises enabling women in the semi urban area to represent their civil and social problems and get them redressed. Prominent lawyers in the town assemble in the centre on every Saturday to listen to the grievances of the ladies and suggest a possible remedy to them. This has become a boon to the underprivileged women in this semi urban area.

### Fostering global competencies among students

The courses are structured in such a way to enable the students be competitive at the global level. Soft skills training and development of English language skills are provided to the students. 'Study Abroad Programme' in which the selected students can take up one of her Semester in UK has enabled the students to compete with their counterparts globally. The college fosters global competencies by periodic updating of syllabus and introduction of new papers.

### Inculcating a value system among students

- ➤ Once in a week, the College Assembly is conducted in which ethical and moral values are taught.
- ➤ All UG programmes, include a course named Value Education.
- ➤ Career and guidance Cell, Students' welfare Committee also acquaint students with values they ought to learn.

### **Promoting use of technology**

Every department of the College has a LCD projector, by which seminars, classroom lectures can be facilitated.

- The College has a Seminar hall, in which the workshops of the departments can be conducted.
- ➤ The College through its 'Computer literacy Programme' enrolls every non-computer science student to learn basics of Computes (both theory and practicals) thus making every student a computer literate.
- ➤ The Tamil Nadu State Government has distributed free laptops to the students which have reduced the technology gap between rural and city students. The students are encouraged to use laptops for submission of assignments and projects.
- > Seamless Wi-Fi facility in the main campus and UGC-Network resource centre with a LAN of 10 PCs also contribute to the update of latest technology.

### **Quest for excellence**

Apart from the departmental association meeting, the departments conduct workshop, seminars, etc. to gain knowledge from external experts.

### 6.1.11 Give details of the UGC autonomous review committee's recommendations and its compliance.

The College was conferred autonomy status in 2007. The autonomous review committee visited the College on 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> September 2014 for the first review and the report is not yet received.

#### **6.2.** Strategy Development and Deployment

# 6.2.1 Does the College have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered in development of policy and strategy.

### Teaching and learning

Smart class room facility, Wi-Fi facility, English language lab with 10 computers connected to a server with language software to improve the communication skills of the students are open to all students. The faculty participates in various academic programmes like orientation / refresher courses, Seminars, conferences, development programmes to update and enrich their knowledge.

### Research and development

The College offers PhD programs in eight disciplines offering part time /full time. Centre for Nonlinear Science (CeNSc) affiliated to Department of Physics has already completed 4 major and 1 minor project and has 3 ongoing research projects. Centre for Animal Studies has a major research project sponsored by UGC. Apart from this, PG students who aspire to pursue research programme get financial assistance from TANSCHE. Offering Part time /Full time research programmes

### **Community engagement**

The college through its NSS and other extension activities actively participates in community development. Students go for field visits, education tour, etc. to gain knowledge from the community. Apart from training the students of the college, skills like Bee-keeping, vermi composting, tailoring courses are offered to local communities, women self help groups and farmers. The College also has planned to take up the Concept of Community College.

### Human resource planning and development

The State Government appoints teaching and non-teaching faculty. The vacancy positions a raising out of the retirement / transfer of permanent faculty has been filled with Guest Lecture by the Government of Tamil Nadu. Appraisal of performance of the faculty is done by obtaining feed back from the students. The existing non-teaching vacancies are filled up with the financial support from Parents'- Teachers' Association.

### **Industry interaction**

It is mandatory to have the representation of an industrialist in the Academic council and Board of Studies of the Departments. They contribute in framing the syllabus as per the needs of the industry. The industrialists of the locality are invited for lectures in which the students can have interactions with them. There is a plan to introduce internship programs to PG students. The Placement Cell of the College has planned to take steps to have collaboration with industries in the near future.

#### Internationalization

As far as research in concerned, CeNSc has established thriving collaborations with several research institute abroad (Please see..) facilitating internationalization of the institute.

Principal is the academic and administrative Head of the College. The Heads of the various departments with Principal as the chair person form the Council. All decisions are taken by the Council.

- As the vision of the College is Women empowerment through higher education, the College takes every step to empower girl students. The syllabi, teaching —learning process and evaluation pattern are validated by a team of experts of high academic credentials from various fields.
- ➤ The IQAC of the College continues to monitor the activities and future plan of the departments. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell established in the academic year 2004 on the basis of the guidelines of NAAC, helps the Principal and Registrar to coordinate and monitor the various activities.
- ➤ The different reports such as departmental reports, performance appraisal reports, self appraisal reports, College annual reports, etc. become the base for analysing and evaluating the overall performance of the institution.

# 6.2.5 How does the College ensure that grievances/complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder-relationship?

Grievance Redressel cell deals with the grievances of the students. A box is kept near the college office in which any grievance letter relating to ragging or other issues can be dropped. The box is opened in the presence of anti-ragging and grievance redressal committee and suitable initiatives are taken. Grievances and complaints from students are referred to the Grievance Redressal Committee comprising of the Principal and two senior faculty who meet to resolve the grievance. It should be mentioned that the institution has never encountered a situation where it had to resolve any students related issues / grivence.

# 6.2.6 Does the College have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If yes, what was the institutional response?

Yes, feedback on institutional performance is obtained from the students. The IQAC of the College collects feedback from the students on the aspects of curriculum, teaching methods and institutional performance. If the College identifies any problems from the appraisal of the students, suitable remedial steps have been initiated in this regard.

The university leads a helping hand to the institution by nominating external/subject experts to participate either in the academic council or Board of studies there by contributing to the institutional development.

The Council for College and Curriculum Development (CCCD) of the Bharathidasan University supports the College for the review of autonomous status, mobilizing resources/funds from UGC and forwarding the research proposals of the faculty to UGC for minor and major research projects. The director of the CCCD is member of the College's Academic Council and offers his input for curriculum development of the college.

# 6.2.9 How does the College get feedback from non-teaching, teaching, parents and alumni on its functioning and how it is utilized?

- > Staff meeting is conducted from time to time during which teaching faculty discuss with the Principal and senior faculty members.
- > The Principal also conducts meeting with non-teaching staff regarding administrative and accounting.
- ➤ Once in a semester, parents-teachers meeting is held in which feedback from parents are obtained and their input are taken into consideration.
- ➤ The Board of Studies meeting of the departments includes one Alumnus as its member and gets feedback in curriculum designing.

# 6.2.10 Does the College encourage autonomy to its academic departments and how does it ensure accountability?

The College encourages autonomy to its departments in framing curriculum within the core structure prescribed and in conducting association meetings, seminars/workshops and conferences. A culture of participating management in the institution ensures that the weight of responsibility spills over to the grass root level as well.

➤ The teaching and non-teaching who are members of a thrift society through which they can easily obtain loans in times of need. Nearly forty teaching and twenty non-teaching faculty are benefited by this.

### **6.4** Financial Management and Resource Mobilisation

#### 6.4.1. What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of financial resources?

- ➤ Being a Government College, it receives financial resources from the government (Budget Allotment) through the Director of Collegiate Education. The fees permitted by the Tamil Nadu Government are being collected from the student every year and are deposited under relevant heads in the State Bank of India (Treasury Branch). Receipts and Expenditure statements are prepared every month reconciled with Treasury (Pay and Accounts Office). The fees collected from the students under various heads such as Union, Games, Magazine, Calendar, etc. are being spent for the purpose for which it was collected based on the resolution of the committee formed every year for.
- ➤ The college also receives funds from UGC Autonomy Grant. Once the funds are received, the financial committee meeting is convened to plan for the expenditure purchase committee then taken over to buy the equipments/furniture/other recourses.
- The UGC funds are are planned by the UGC committee
- > The principal and the bursar monitor the effective and efficient use of available resources following the rules and regulation of State Government.

### 6.4.2 Does the College have a mechanism for internal and external audit? Give details.

Internal audit regarding stock and vouchers are done by inter department faculty and reports submitted to the Principal. External audit is conducted by the Directorate of Collegiate Education and the office of the Accountant General. The account of the Examination Fund is being audited by a chartered accountant.

Yes, the college has a separate committee for reviewing the teaching learning process.

#### The structure:

The Principal, IQAC coordinator, Heads of the Departments form the core committee for continuous review of the teaching learning process.

### **Methodology of operation:**

- Teaching and learning is assessed based on students' feedback.
- Format for feedback is prepared by the committee members and given to all the students at the end of the academic year.
- ➤ The feedback forms are collected and consolidated by the Heads of Departments and submitted to the IQAC.
- > IQAC compiles the feedback of students for the entire college and initiates appropriate measures.

#### **Outcome:**

Based on the outcome of the feedback, the Heads of Departments will inform the staff about their strengths and weaknesses.

- Organized Faculty Development Programmes.
- ➤ Wi-Fi access to the main campus with 100 concurrent users and monitoring.

# 6.5.5 Does the IQAC have external members on its committees? If so, mention any significant contribution made by such members.

**Yes**. The IQAC has external experts from the year of its inauguration. There are external subject experts, industrial representatives, OSA and PTA members.

### Significant contributions made by External experts:

- > Dr. Ebanazar, Associate Professor of Zoology gave valuable suggestions for mobilizing resources from funding agencies.
- > Dr. Nagarajan, Associate Professor of Zoology and Wild Life Biology initiated the process of internal Audit system.
- ➤ Mrs T.Nirmala, the Retired professor and old student of the college offered her suggestions in curriculum designing.
- > Dr. S.M. Martin, the local industrialist gave lot of inputs for extension activities, NGO participation and village adoption.
- ➤ Mr.B.Anand, Technical Engineer Bharathidasan University gave valuable suggestions in website maintenance/design, alumni registration, and students feedback assessment system.

# 6.5.6 Has the IQAC conducted any study on the incremental academic growth of students from disadvantaged sections of society?

(99%) students of the college belong to disadvantaged sections of society like SC, ST and OBC non creamy layer.

The growing number of graduates/post graduates every year is itself an indication that the college has contributed to the academic growth of students belonging to the underprivileged sections of the society.

Members of IQAC meet twice a year to make a review of students' performance, infrastructure availability, evaluation of content and reforms in testing and evaluation. Suggestions are made by the committee to take appropriate improvement and corrective measures.

### 7. Criterian VII: Innovations and Best Practices

#### 7.1 Environment Consciousness

## 7.1.1 Does the college conduct a green audit of its campus?

The College takes measures to inculcate environmental consciousness among students by all means.

- The college, irrespective of its semi urban surroundings, is bestowed with lush green vegetation. Anyone who enters the threshold of the college is bewitched by the beautiful patches of Korean grass studded with multicolored rose plants and the tall green trees which are strewn all over the campus providing a clement atmosphere for academic pursuit.
- The Environment Studies under Part V of the college with the help of faculty and students takes efforts to keep the campus green and clean.
- ➤ Under Environmental Studies of Part V the college, volunteers from NSS, YRC and EVS undertake campus cleaning activity every week.
- ➤ Invited talks, workshops are arranged to create awareness among students about the dangerous consequence of using plastic bags.
- ➤ Efforts are made to make the college a polythene free zone by removing Plastic covers periodically from the campus.
- The college is declared as 'No Tobacco Zone'.

### 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

### **Energy Conservation**

- ➤ All the classrooms in the college including the labs, office room, and the Principal's room enjoy very good aeration and ventilation so that no lights and fans are required during college working hours.
- > Students are instructed to switch off the lights and fans when not required faculty advisors deputes students representatives to check whether fans are switched off in and unoccupied class rooms.
- Energy consumption in the hostel is closely monitored by the superintendents.
- > Strict adherence to college norms of turning off the electricity during day time in hostels
- Fluorescent tube lights are being replaced with energy tube lights.
- ➤ Use of alternate energy resources in campus includes installation of solar lamps in Principal's office and hostel for less electricity consumption.

### **Use of Renewable Energy**

### **Solar Energy**

As per Tamil Nadu Solar Energy Policy 2012, 6% of the captive power is mandatory from solar energy for educational institutions. With a view to reduce the electricity power consumption, two solar power plants were installed with the financial supports (Rs. 6,00,000) from UGC autonomy grant, after obtaining necessary permission from UGC SERO, Hyderabad. Ours is the first government college in Tamil Nadu to install solar power plant. This provides uninterrupted power supply to the Principal's room, administrative office and the controller's office.

### **Water Harvesting**

Three Rain Water Harvesting points were constructed inside the college premises.

### **Efforts for Carbon Neutrality**

- ➤ The dry leaves and the waste papers are not burnt but they are buried in the soil itself and Leaf litter from the campus is converted into vermicompost as organic manure.
- ➤ Plantation of trees has been increased to absorb CO2 emitted in the atmosphere and to provide and effective screen in covering carbon inflow.
- > There are a lot of trees inside the college premises. In fact, the town's biggest and oldest trees are to be found in the college campus only.
- ➤ Bearing in mind the fact that cultivation and usage of Azolla as a bio fertilizer for rice and other plants like banana improves water quality, soil quality and prevents global warming, the Department of Zoology conducted a training programme for Azolla Cultivation" in the academic year 2011-12 under UGC merged schemes of XI plan. Around 60 students were imparted training for Azolla cultivation along with other bio fertilizer production and livestock management. Each student was given an azolla cultivation kit and assurance was obtained from them that they will practice the method in their villages.

#### **Plantation**

- ➤ Every year at the time of NSS special camp, samplings are planted inside the college premises.
- ➤ Whenever the state government or the district administration announces tree plantation campaigns, the college comes forward to plant maximum number of saplings inside the college premises and the adopted villages.
- ➤ Korean grasses are grown in front of the entrance side building (ESB) with the funds received from PD I account.
- ➤ Daily and periodical watering of plants is undertaken by the students. For that purpose, total area of the college is divided between 4 Departments of the college.
- A gardener has been appointed on a temporary basis and the college gardens are maintained in a good manner.

### **Hazardous Waste Management**

In Department of Zoology, utmost care is taken to dispose micro organisms after sterilization.

- All the glass wares used in microbiology practical classes are strictly sterilized and then only allowed for washing.
- Even fish pathogens handled in Center for Animal Studies are disposed after autoclaving.
- The college avoids the usage of severe corrosive chemicals in the practical classes and sees that minimum quantity chemicals are purchased to save expiry and disposal.
- > Solid wastage in the chemistry is collected separately and disposed off carefully without causing any harm to the inmates.
- > Special drainages are constructed to dispose of the chemical waste from the lab.
- Adequate number of exhaust fans and fume hoods are also provided.

#### E-Waste Management

In order to avoid accumulation of e -waste, the Department of Computer Science always go for buy back system for purchase of batteries and other computer spare parts.

#### **Integrating Environemental Education in the Curriculum**

- Environmental Studies has been introduced as a compulsory course in the curriculum for all programmes.
- Apart from that under Part V extension activities, Environmental Education is one of the choice for the students for which 2 credits were given.
- ➤ Environment related courses were introduced as a core course in Department of Geography and Zoology.

#### 7.2 Innovations

### 7.2.1 Provide details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functions of the College.

- ➤ 2013-2014 Solar power plants were installed
- ➤ WiFi enabling of the Main campus with seamless connectivity and monitoring through Firewall.
- Launching of NPTEL Multimedia portal with 250 courses in LAN and wireless.
- Introducing feedback system from students, staff and other stake holders.
- > Initiation of External and Internal Academic Audit.
- > Establishment of Day Care Centre.

#### 7.3 Best Practices

### 7.3.1 Give details of any two best practices which have contributed to better academic and administrative functioning of the College

#### I. 1. Title of the Practice:

**Day Care Centre** 

#### 2. Objective of the Practice:

The Day Care Centre was established with two prime objectives

- To prevent students from discontinuing their studies under the pretext of babysitting.
- > To ensure uninterrupted academic work from the staff by providing homely ambience for their children.

#### 3. The Context

Marriage and child birth at times becomes an impediment in the academic and professional growth of women. Getting married while studying in college is quite common in this region of the state. The ambitious parents want to get their wards to be graduated and married at the same time. Hence, they arrange for early marriages for their daughters.

As a result, some students discontinue their studies as soon as they get pregnant or give birth to a child. In order to avoid the incidence of drop outs in the name of marriage or childbirth, the college has come out with the idea of starting a day care centre for students and staff as well.

Joint family system of bygone days is replaced with nuclear family. As result, the children of employed women have been left uncared for. The town Kumbakonam, being situated in a semi urban area surrounded by agricultural villages, uneducated women opt for agricultural labor rather than a maidservant's job. Hence, the unavailability of baby sitters. Moreover ,it is unadvisable to leave the children in the custody of unknown maid servants. So ,the college has decided to help out the staff and students by starting a crèche within the college premises. This enables the staff and the students to execute their business with a relaxed mind.

#### 4. The Practice

The Day Care Centre was established in the academic year 2008-09 under the UGC Merged Schemes. With the support of the then Head of the Department of English, the HOD room of the Department of English was temporarily converted in to a baby sitting room in the beginning. A baby sitter is appointed on a temporary basis to take care of the babies. A meager amount is collected from the beneficiaries to meet out the expenses. In the academic year 2009-10, it was shifted to the ground floor of the Commerce Block. Now, it is accommodated in a spacious room with all the basic amenities like refrigerator, bureau, cot, mixer, stove, cradle, toys, mats etc. In the academic year 2014-15, to mark the golden jubilee of the College, an inter-school competition was organized for the pre KG, LKG, UKG & I standard students of schools situated in Kumbakonam taluk.

#### 5. Evidence of Success

- The incidence of dropouts (students who discontinue their studies in order to take care of their children) is reduced to a great extent.
- The teaching faculty stays back in the afternoon and does a lot of constructive work.

#### 6. Problems encountered and resources required

The college received financial assistance only for establishment and not for maintenance.

There is no separate building for this purpose. Need a separate building.

#### II. 1. Title of the Practice:

#### **Entrepreneurial Development Cell**

#### 2. Objective of the Practice

- > To make the students earn while they learn.
- To train the students to become women entrepreneurs. .
- > To prevent migration of people from rural to urban areas in search of employment.
- To stabilize the economy of the country by encouraging women to participate in the economical development of the country.

#### 3. The Context

Entrepreneurship is the spirit of a person which may be inherent or developed. For the economic development of a country, entrepreneurial skills need to be developed. The advantages of entrepreneurial development are that it leads to freedom, flexibility, growth and development and it also develops leadership quality among younger generation. The managerial and creative skills developed for entrepreneurship are useful and applied to social causes, The concept can be applied to any area of development like economic development, rural development, export development, social development etc.

The making of an entrepreneur occurs by accumulating the relevant skill; know how experience and contacts developed over a period of several years.

Economists and sociologists viewed that entrepreneurs, are born and not made. Experience clearly shows that it is possible to develop entrepreneurs through planned efforts. The fact is that the entrepreneurs are born as well as made. It is a combination of talent, native genius and born in-sight. However, unless they are awakened and sharpened, encouraged and supported, the inborn talent is unlikely to transform and bring new dynamism.

Generally 20% of the people are born with desire and talent for entrepreneurship and such person need not be awakened but only need proper support system. 40 of the people have the capacity and capability to become successful entrepreneurs but they need to be enthused and developed. The remaining 40% have no capacity or inclination for entrepreneurship. So, it is possible to identify the middle group i.e. those who could be encouraged to become entrepreneurs and develop and sharpen their skills.

To create and develop entrepreneurial talent in the country, the need is to motivate and identify the talent, educate, train and sponsor them.

#### 4. Practice

Under Part V Extension Activities, EDC is one of the choice for the students. Every academic year more than 200 students are enrolled and various training are imparted.

#### 5. Evidence of Success

- > The students become financially independent and their dependence on their parents for financial support is reduced to a great extent.
- > Students who have undergone various trainings given in the College train other students and also members of the self help groups and thereby offer consultancy service.
- > Students display their handmade works in an exhibition. Their handicrafts are sold and they make money out of it within the campus itself.

#### 6. Problems encountered and resources required

- Lack of separate room to accommodate trainees at the time of training.
- Lack of financial assistance to procure raw materials and instruments.

- For 120 seats of B.Com, every year the department receives more than 1000 applications.
- ➤ All the three permanent faculty are Ph. D holders and eight staff members are NET/SET/SLET holders.
- ➤ The department has 3 computers with internet facility, one LCD projector and one electronic podium.

#### Weakness

#### **Challenges**

- The problem of unemployment should be tackled by encouraging more students to become entrepreneurs.

- Steps should be taken to arrange for internship training and to conduct workshops/ seminars, etc to gain exposure.



Management

The College is a State Government owned institution. Problems of the College particularly severe shortage of regular faculty was brought to the notice of the Regional Joint Director, Collegiate Education who was member of the visiting committee as a State Government Nominee. The Committee requested her to fill up the post of Director / Faculty in Physical Education on priority basis. The Joint Director was a requested to facilitate filling up vacant post of Technical Assistants and also considered teaching and non teaching staff from other institutions where ever feasible.

#### > Faculty

Teachers of the college are in favour of Autonomy. They unanimously supported extension of Autonomy. At Departments level, they presented to the committee their academic achievements. Teachers are actively engaged in teaching as well as co-curricular and extra curricular activities in the campus other than supporting administration. They expressed the need for clerical assistance at department level.

#### > Students

Students supported Autonomous mode to the college. They wanted that job oriented courses be started. They wanted placement cell and arrange for campus interviews. Student strength has been increasing steadily.

#### Non Teaching Staff

They expressed the need for additional staff to bear with the steadily increasing work load associated with increasing student strengthen and campus programmes. In general they supported extension of Autonomy to the college.

#### > Parents & Alumni

Expressed happiness about teaching, discipline in the campus and fees structure. They expressed the need for establishing Health Centre.

- A voluntary Noon meal scheme is implemented for poor students through generous donations from the faculty and staff.
- Bee keeping, Vermi composting and Entrepreneurship development programme are implemented in the campus.

# 15. Observations & Suggestions of the Committee

The college was established in the year 1963 with the objective of providing quality education to the college students coming from socio economically weak sections. On the basis of visit by the visiting committee the following suggestions are made for further development of the college:

- Large number of vacant teaching positions should be filled up on priority basis.
- Top priority may be accorded to filling up of a teacher / director in physical education.
- Considering the demand, the college may apply for women hostel to the
- NCC unit, Placement cell, Bank with ATM, Post office and language labs need to be established
- Since it is women's college, a Health Centre with all the facilities is required on priority basis.
- Automation of the examination section may be carried out.
- Generator facilities are required particularly for science departments.
- There is shortage of non teaching staff also. Clerical Assistance is required for academic departments.
- New courses in applied areas may be started.
- Though there are hostels, there is need for more hostel facilities.

# 16. Recommendations of the Committee

The Committee during the visit has interacted with the Principal, Faculty, Staff and students. The Physical Infrastructural facilities available in the campus were also seen. The visiting committee resolved to recommend for extension of Autonomous Status for a period of two years 2012-2013 and 2013-2014 as ex-post facto and for a of period six academic years with effect from 2014-2015 to 2019-2020 to Government College for Women (Autonomous) Kumbakonam, Thanjavur District, Tamil Nadu affiliated to Bharathidasan University, Triruchirappalli, Tamilnadu.


